GENDERBREAD PERSON

EVERY human has these 4 traits:

EXPRESSION – how you present yourself (hair, clothing, makeup, style, etc.)


IDENTITY – the gender your brain conceives itself: male, female, androgynous, etc. and may or may not align with birth gender assignation

ATTRACTION – Emotional, romantic, or sexual attraction.

SEX – physical and genetic characteristics








WHEN IN DOUBT, JUST ASK!!

INTERSECTIONALITY

A way to examine and understand the ways in which each person's multiple identities interact and inform their lived experience

SUBSTANCE USE IN THE LGBTQ+ COMMUNITY



HOMELESSNESS IN THE LGBTQ+ COMMUNITY

- How many US adults have experienced homelessness in the past 12 months?
 - 1% of cisgender straight adults
 - 3% of cisgender and genderqueer sexual minority (LGB+) adults
 - 6% of Black cisgender/genderqueer LGB+ adults
 - 8% of transgender adults (across sexualities)

MENTAL HEALTH AND THE LGBTQ+ COMMUNITY


- Over 55% of LGBTQ+ youth screen positive for depression
 - Almost 64% screen positive for anxiety
 - Nearly half report wanting therapy but cannot attend
- 41% of gender expansive youth (trans, nb, gender fluid, agender) never have their chosen name used at home
 - Over 70% of them screen positive for anxiety, compared to those whose families always use their correct name (61.9%)

LGBTQ+ VICTIMS OF CRIME

- Gay and lesbian adults are more than 2 times more likely to be the victim of a violent crime than straight adults
- Transgender adults are 2.5 times more likely to be the victim of a violent crime than cisgender adults
- Gay and lesbian adults are more than twice as likely to be victims of domestic violence than straight adults, while bisexual adults are eight times as likely
- About 1 in 10 victimizations of an LGBTQ+ person are hate crimes
- More than half of gender expansive youth report being victimized at school and a majority of LGBTQ+ youth do not feel safe in school settings

BEST PRACTICES

IN GENERAL...

- Avoid assumptions about a person's experiences based on their identity
- Normalize asking for a person's name and pronouns and share your own
- Use consistent (and inclusive!) language across all encounters
- Be open about gender segregated bathrooms, holding cells, etc.
 - Ask where someone will feel <u>safest</u>

DOCUMENTATION

- ALWAYS ask how someone would like their demographic information to be documented
 - o Be honest about limitations of data collection and demographic options

• EXAMPLE:

At about 1040hrs on 1 September 2024, I met with Ms. Vanessa Kahn at 61 Southside Drive regarding a vehicle theft. Ms. Kahn said she parked her car by a parking meter outside Southside Shopping Center and went to return a faulty flashlight she had purchased the previous day. She said that when she returned to the lot at about 1000 hours, she discovered her car was missing.

MAKING MISTAKES

- EXAMPLE 1: You are talking about someone who goes by "he/him" pronouns. "She is a great student. I'm sorry, I meant to say he is a great student. He's been reading all of the assignments very thoroughly and it's been a pleasure to work with him."
- EXAMPLE 2: You are talking in a meeting to someone who goes by "they/them" pronouns. "His idea for that project is going to work very well. Let's try that." Later, after the meeting, you realize that you used the incorrect pronouns for that person

IN CONCLUSION

- We are all still learning
 - Continue to educate yourself and seek out opportunities to become more informed
 - If you don't know, just ask!
